With the small number of cases per annum, is there really anything to worry about?

Well, of the 660 - 670 litters born every year, only about 40% are eye screened. Of the 35,000 - 40,000 Miniatures in the UK, less than 600 are tested each year. Yet, if all the adults in breeding programmes were tested, you would expect the number of eye tests to be in excess of 800

All of this means that, as we all know, there will be a significant number of 'carriers' in the gene pool. Whilst we all take every possible care with our breeding programmes (our breed has one of, if not 'THE, best record for eye testing), the best solution will be a successful DNA test for each condition.

That's why the JMSEF was set up by the NSC, the MSC and SCGB, to raise money to support this work. It's as important now as it was just 7 years ago.

In the meantime, the funds are securely held in interest-bearing accounts, safeguarded by the Constitution which has previously been agreed by the NSC, acknowledged by the SCGB and deemed appropriate for its needs (in writing) by The Kennel Club and, separately, by the Kennel Club Chairman.

Anyone wanting to see Bank Statements, certified Arinual Reports or any other financial information, just ask any one of the JMSEF (Gill Ogburn, Liz Longdin, Ann Swallow, Sue McGrann or Tony McDerrnott).

Is the total now too much?

Very definitely it is not. Just look at the figures we may be involved with. Each one condition (CHC, HC or PRA) will, at 2002 prices, take at least £20,000 to start research, once we have sufficient samples in each.

CHC: There are now enough cases to initiate the research but further DNA swabs have been requested from some of those dogs. Once received by the AHT, the whole genome scan (WGS) work can commence. This now needs extra funding, as originally, it was being undertaken within existing research funds.

Is CHC still a problem?

Well, there have been at least two further litters diagnosed as affected in the last 12 months, sadly with 8 or 9 of the pupples having CHC, out of a total of 14.

HC: we are still gathering DNA samples and the numbers continue to rise. Samples have also been supplied by breeders overseas. The start of the WGS for this condition is a bit further off but there are sufficient numbers of cases to it represents the same sort of danger to Minis as CHC.

PRA: Fortunately, this condition doesn't present itself too often in the UK although eye specialists say it is seen in the normal course of events (though not under the eye scheme).

Again, the JMSEF have appealed to breeders throughout the world to contribute DNA samples of any affected dog to the AHT
